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# Luisa Loves Cats and Dogs

Jon Molyneux, from Romford in Essex, purchased **LUI 54** for his wife after a 13-year search. "Since I met my wife, Luisa, all that time ago, I have been on a secret mission searching and waiting for this very special combination to become available," says Jon. "With Regtransfers' help, at long last, I secured it earlier this year as an extra special birthday present."

The unusual spelling of the name results from Luisa's Italian heritage.

"Of course, finding such a plate in mainland UK was technically impossible," says Jon, "as the letter 'I' is not used. But then I learned that Northern Irish plates, which can start with the letters LUI, can be transferred to any other UK vehicle." Regtransfers tracked it down for him and **LUI 54** ('Luisa') now sits proudly on her JCW Mini Cooper S.

Luisa has just started her own business, an online and high street bespoke gift boutique for discerning pets and their owners, called 'Love Cats And Dogs' and the Mini, with its distinctive registration, attracts quite a lot of attention parked outside the boutique in Shenfield, near Brentwood, Essex.

"The shop is a celebration of all things cat and dog," says Luisa. "I noticed that there was a gap in the market for a store that sold high quality, predominately handcrafted, organic and UK-made products for cats, dogs and their owners. "I wanted to create a one-stop shop where you could buy everything from an exquisite handmade cat collar to a ladies cashmere scarf in bespoke labrador fabric."

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"I was looking for a private reg plate for a number of years and decided to register my interest on your website," says Paul Milner, "so that I could receive text alerts and regular emails about the things I was interested in without having to keep going back and looking all the time."

The plan paid off when, to Paul's amazement, he received a text message saying that the registration **PM11 NER** was available. "I could not believe the plate, so I rang Regtransfers straight away and told them I wanted to order the plate. I paid my money and just sat back and hoped they were able to secure it for me."

On the morning of the release date, Paul received another text message to say that the plate was his. "I was overjoyed," he says, "and could not wait to tell everyone."

#### **GREG RUTHERFORD GOING FOR GOLD**

lympic and Commonwealth Games gold medalist Greg Rutherford is something of a local sporting hero to people in Regtransfers' neighbourhood. From our offices in Dunstable it is just a quick drive up the A5 to Greg's home town of Bletchley, now part of Milton Keynes, and to his current home near Woburn Sands. Faced with such a convenient geographical coincidence, it is, perhaps, surprising that we actually met Greg in the middle of London, some 35 miles in the other direction.

Bearing in mind Greg's spectacular gold medal winning performance in the 2012 Olympics we thought it would be appropriate to mark the achievement in some way when we delivered his personalised number plates so we arranged for a posh presentation box. In retrospect, perhaps that was a mistake if we had hoped to get Greg to wax lyrical and enthusiastic about personal registrations - although he was very pleased with his plates, he almost seemed more impressed with the box.

"A personalised registration is something I've considered so many times and never gone for. I know other people who have them: Andy Turner, has got L10 RUN or something like that on his plate, so that's for 110 metres hurdles. But I thought **GBR 601D** was absolutely fantastic for me and I was really excited. And it's come in an amazing box as well. You've really gone to town on this, guys. It's like a big fanfare of a box: absolutely out of this world. This is going to take pride of place at home; I'm going to put it on my mantlepiece."

It seems as if Greg is going to become increasingly accustomed to elaborate presentations and accolades. At the time of our meeting he was still riding the wave of post-Olympic aftermath: that pervasive delight that swept the country after the home team's splendid performance at London 2012, where they secured a total of 65 medals: 29 gold, 17 silver and 19 bronze. His career and its gold medal-winning culmination up to that point was recognised with the MBE in 2013, but in the time that has passed since then, Greg's successful streak has grown into a broad stripe of apparent invulnerability. Gold was his at the 2014 Commonwealth Games in Glasgow and again at the 2014 European Athletics Championships in Zürich. This is an athlete on top form.





One might think that a serial gold medal-winning and British record-holding long jumper would have to emerge from the womb with spring-loaded knees and a love of sandpits, but Greg Rutherford arrived at his specialist discipline after a considerable journey through various sports.

"I did a bit of everything: football, rugby, badminton... I did every sport that was thrown at me. I started off in track and field as a sprinter but then realised that I'd never be quite good enough to go on and take that up as a professional. On the other hand, when I tried the long jump I progressed rapidly, so I stuck with it. I got to about 18 and I thought, *Right, I'll do this as a job as well*. Then I really dedicated everything to it. Up to that point and that decision I'd taken everything a little bit relaxed, a bit chilled out." One way or another, Greg had always intended to compete professionally.

"I told myself that I would make it in sport of one sort or another, and that's why I tried everything I could. Football was an interesting one. I had trials at Aston Villa when I was about 13, but I got a bit disillusioned with it because I didn't enjoy it particularly. There was a lot of pressure and eventually I just walked away from that sport and tried other things. I was enjoying track and badminton probably a bit more. I realised that badminton was way too hard for me to take on as a career for life, and track and field just seemed to be getting better and better. I loved it as well - being outside all the time, being really active.

"I had a job until I was about 19; then I got funding, which meant that I didn't need to have a job. So I had the support arrangement that meant that I could pay the bills I needed to pay as well as train. That basically gave me the opportunity to train full time. So, I trained practically every day. As I say, I focused everything on track and field. That's basically what your life becomes: everything is about that and you can't do things that you'd normally do. All of a sudden, at 18 or 19 you've gone from going out with your mates to having to stay in and sacrificing the things you used to do. But for me, as I say, I was determined to make it in sport and I realised that was what I had to do.

"The Olympics was the culmination of so many years. The thing is that much as it was a fantastic year, I do remember seven years before that in my professional career that hadn't been that good. It's really tough in track and field: it's not the same as things



like football and rugby where you get a big salary, and no matter what happens - injury or whatever else - you're earning a large sum of money. In track, if you're injured then you're missing competitions and you have no chance of earning money. So, for many years it was a bit of a struggle and things weren't ideal for me.

"I remember earlier when I went to the World Championships in amazing shape, ranked highly and I really thought I was going to win a medal. Injury again meant that I got completely and utterly knocked back, but then all of a sudden I have a good year and it just happens to be the best year to have a good year. I went to the Olympic Games feeling incredibly fit to start with and really, really confident. All year I'd been jumping well. I'd had a couple of little niggles, but nothing major, and then all of a sudden I was in the Olympic stadium, feeling fit and healthy and ready to go."

Fit and healthy indeed. Greg won one of four gold medals that went to British athletics competitors. We asked him what it actually felt like to win an Olympic gold medal.

"That's probably the hardest question there is to answer because there are no words that can genuinely describe the emotion that you feel. In fact, you seem almost to go through every emotion you've probably ever felt in your life all kind of rolled into one. It just hits you, and everything you've ever dreamed of and wanted... suddenly you've got it. It's a strange thing because ultimately my dreams have been of winning an Olympic gold medal. The other things that come with it are amazing, but that was what it was always about. But then you've achieved it, so what do you do with yourself? You've sacrificed everything and now it's happened, but it's a strange thing that your brain can't really comprehend what's actually going on. So, I mean, obviously, complete joy... It's a massive relief as well because it sort of proves that all the hard work you've been doing has worked and it's finally paid off and it's done. It's a feeling I've only ever had once and I doubt I'll ever have again. It really was incredible."

However, it wasn't long before Greg had another experience that rivalled his Olympic win for intensity.

"Getting the MBE was pretty amazing. I was probably more nervous about that than I was going into the Olympic park. At the end of the day, I jump into sand - I mean, that's my living - and I found myself standing in a

room with people who... For example, one bloke I was speaking to has fostered 22 children over 50 years. He changed their lives. He has made an incredible impact directly upon people. What an amazing person. And I stood there thinking, *Well, I just jumped into sand, had a good competition and won.* I sort of felt a little bit inferior.

"There I was in the most iconic place in the world about to meet probably the most famous figure in the world, and I've got to go and have a chat with her as she gives me a medal. I was completely and utterly bricking it, mate. It was a weird, weird scenario to be in. But it was great. The Queen said to me that the profile of athletics has changed a lot, which was fantastic to hear. We compete a lot in the summer but, ultimately, not a lot of it is shown on TV. It's not been a high-profile sport, so to hear her say that was encouraging.

"It's just a fantastic day. The dresses, the old school morning suits and top hats... It was a great added extra to what had already been an amazing summer."

However, now his trip to the palace is over and done with, Greg has work to do. The next big competition is never as far away as it may seem.

"They're always at the back of your mind. Ultimately, the Olympics are what defines

your legacy as an athlete in the general public's eyes, so you're always thinking about the next Olympics. As it stands now I've got a couple more championships, the Commonwealth Games and a couple of Europeans all before that. You can't be blase about these other events because they are all hugely important."

Success in international competition obviously means more travel and more time away from home. Does Greg get homesick?

"You're surrounded by friends and there's always the phone and Skype, but I do miss my two dogs, my two labradors. My parents look after them. They live with me when I'm at home. It was kind of a rash move to get two dogs; I didn't think about the fact that I'm away a lot. But then, my mum and dad get on really well with them. They get treated really well at my parents' house. They get fattened up. My mum tells me how my dad always gives them a bit of his breakfast. I have to put them on a bit of a diet when I get back. I think when they see me they think, *Oh*, no! Have to go on the diet again!"

enthusiast. Members are able to enjoy the freedom to use any of our fleet cars as well as having access to exclusive and rare car models. We are all very excited about this new venture: not least the excuse it provides to buy more cars."

The family does love its cars. For some members the appeal of a vehicle is not in its value or its exclusivity but in its perceived practicality. Upon seeing a Lamborghini Gallardo in the driveway, Dee's late grandmother advised his mum that she should choose that car for her shopping trips. Oblivious to the engine power and price tag, she saw it was low to the ground which meant that both ladies would be able to get in and out easily,



and its striking colour meant that they would be able to find it easily if they forgot where it was parked. Dee decided to get them a chauffeur instead!

One of the great advantages of owning a business like Signature is being able to

drive any number of luxury marques such as Aston Martin, Lamborghini, Porsche and Bentley through to Range Rover and Rolls Royce. Dee's personal preference is the Bentley GTC with its power, luxury and style, perfect for pleasure and relaxation.





However, for day to day, practical use, a Range Rover remains his ultimate choice.

Dee's enthusiasm for quality cars is complemented by a similar enthusiasm for good quality private registrations.

"My first plate was **M3 BOY**, followed by **M5 BOY**. Those two were for my M3 BMW and M5 BMW. Both certainly reflected my age and personality at the time! They are still treasured number plates for their sentiments but not currently on any of the fleet."

His next car dictated his next number plate, which was **9 DEE** for his 911 Porsche. The number partly reflected that car model but was also his house number at the time. **9 DEE** was the first of several unbeatable name registrations. **DEE 1**, **DEE 2** and **DEE 3** soon followed.

"Plates like this have helped gain business, it is a point of interest and topic of conversation, a real ice breaker. It always makes people laugh and puts them at ease which is essential in business. It is certainly something interesting to talk about with clients," says Dee.

Signature has a host of plates that begin with 'S19' and 'S16' ('SIG') that promote the company's identity. These plates all have a variety of different endings to reflect the make of the vehicle including 'GTC' for Bentley GTC, 'VOG' for Range Rover Vogue, 'AMV' for Aston Martin Virage and Volante and 'HSE' for Range Rover HSE Sport.

Similarly, Signature has a range of plates for the Bentley Flying Spur Speed, such as **SP12 FLY** and **SP11 FLY**; the 'SP' and 'FLY' signifying 'Speed', 'Spur' and 'Flying'. The Mercedes AMGs all end in 'AMG' and of course the Lamborghini LP560 Spyders have the number plates **LP58 SPY** and **LP56 SPY** which also highlight the car model LP560 and the name 'Spyder'. The Porsche Boxster has plate **BX12 TER** and the Vianos follow a similar pattern including **V5 ANO** and **V2 ANO**.

As well as the business number plates, Dee couldn't resist purchasing **MI55 DEE** for his sister, Jyoti, when she joined the business. Many contractors and labourers working for the family at the time assumed her name was Miss Dee because they had always addressed Dee as Mr. Dee. He never corrected them and found it very amusing when Jyoti actually started answering to that name.

Arl Formstone's interest in personal number plates started in the 1970s when he was just seven or eight years of age. "We had a family outing to the museum in Liverpool and in the museum was the first car off the Ford production line at Halewood," he recalls. "It was a Ford Anglia with the registration **1 KF**. "I spend a bit of time looking on your website at some other plates as investments," says Karl, "and came across **SAU 1L**, which really caught my eye as our youngest son's name is Saul."

"I have **MR51 MMS** on a black Jaguar XJ, long wheelbase, and **M51 MMS** on a black 2.2 Vauxhall Turbo Insignia Saloon. I think they're great advertising, and I can get full

In 2007, he transferred the number to his Mercedes Vito and purchased **RIW 9**, which conveniently includes his middle initial, from Regtransfers. The number 9 coincidentally represents the age difference between the two brothers. "Other than that," says Robert, "there is no particular significance, although it always seems to have been a lucky number for us."





#### Baba Ghai

Daveinder Kumar Ghai, known to friends and colleagues as Baba Ghai ('Baba' is a term of respect of Persian origin used throughout South Asia to address community elders and holy men), is an acclaimed international statesman and champion of inter-faith pluralism. "Obviously **GHA 1** spells my surname perfectly," says Daveinder. "For many years I was intrigued about where that registration might be. I never imagined I would one day see it on my own car."

"Most people have to be quite creative to make a number plate resemble their name, so of course I am extremely fortunate that **GHA 1** is such a perfect fit, and something the Ghai family can value and pass on for generations.

"I originally had the AAFS logo and Union Jack printed on my number plates until a friendly senior police officer politely reminded me of the legal specifications."

One aspect of the AAFS' diverse charitable portfolio involves helping new immigrants to settle and progress in the UK. Many have told Daveinder that seeing **GHA 1** for the first time made a powerful impression and that working hard to get their own person-

alised number one day became a strong motivational target and personal aspiration.


"I'm very pleased to say that many have fulfilled this personal aspiration over the years," he says, "and you will be pleased to know I have always referred them to Regtransfers!"

#### DEN 275 now 'back on track'

In July 2008 H&H Classic Auctions sold a 'barn find' 1954 Lister Bristol sports racing car boasting a great racing history. It had been laid up for many years but was virtually complete and had a guide price of £50-£70,000. It sold for £126,500 to Keith Fell on behalf of historic racer Stephen Bond, whose company Bond Aviation specialises in helicopter support.

The Lister was raced in 1955 by fifties gentleman racer John Horridge, whose family owned a calico printing business in my home town of Bury where the 'EN' series of registrations was originally issued. The car was fitted with lights and road registered as DEN 275 in May 1955 so that it could be driven to race meetings they did in those days!

Horridge had a successful motor racing career, starting with a 2-litre Bugatti in 1952 followed by a Rochdale special based on a Jowett Jupiter chassis but with a 1.5 litre Riley engine and registered BEN 775. He then bought a Lister Bristol for the '54 and '55 seasons racing under the 'Ecurie
