And I've been on tour, travelling around, which makes it tricky to fit in any exercise. You'd think that I'd be doing it all the time because when you're staying in a hotel you've got access to a gym, but when they throw you in with a load of twenty-somethings who go out drinking after the show, it never happens. Nine times out of ten I was still in bed at 11 o'clock in the morning!"

There's more to Denise's look than just being fit and healthy. She looks as glamorous in real life as she does on the telly.

"Oh, I definitely don't look glamorous all the time! But thank you."

Denise doesn't go in for full-on cosmetic surgery, but she openly champions less drastic measures.

"I don't really want surgery or anything. The treatments I have are quite good because they're laser, they're non-invasive. I'm quite an advocate for saying you don't have to go under the knife. I think there are other ways you can often get the same results. The guy's good. He's coming over

later today, actually. I'm going to have a facial, but this is just one for cleansing."

Back in her Big Breakfast days, Denise didn't look after herself quite so well.

"Yeah. The '90s were a bit of a blur but I've got photographs so I can look back on them! It was a fun time. I sort of miss it really but I just couldn't do it now. I'd be too tired and I like my sleep too much. Golf is clubbing for the middle-aged. All the people I see on the golf course are people who used to be out at the clubs. We've just reversed it - we do it as a day thing now. We play golf during the day and then hit the clubhouse and get drunk there instead. At least these days we get to bed at a reasonable hour."

The work schedule, however, still sounds pretty non-stop.

"I've just done the Dancing on Ice arena tour as a judge with Chris Dean and Jane Torvill. Obviously they're the skating experts, but for the judging panel they wanted someone who could come in and judge performance. Because I'd done a lot of theatre they asked me if I'd judge that aspect, just so they had it all covered. That side of it isn't really Chris and Jane's bag, that whole entertainment thing. It was really good, I loved it.

"The tour finished a week and a half ago, so now I'm back to doing Loose Women. I don't do that every day: I do either a couple of days a week or a couple of days every two weeks. It depends really. There's a group of us and we kind of work it all between us. The producer will often call me if someone's off sick because I've got a flat in London so I'm one of the local ones and I can get in quite quickly, whereas some of the other loose women like Coleen (Nolan)

so it's tricky for them to get in. I do enjoy it. It's good and we have a giggle.

"It's quite a busy year really because Ireland's Got Talent starts again, so we'll get busy with that towards the end of the summer when they start the audition process and everything. I'm also in talks to do another West End show, which I'd kind of like to do this year. I always try to have a bit of a break between West End shows because they're so time-consuming. I normally do one every couple of years and I've started to get that itch again to do another one. The last was my one-woman show, Some Girl I Used to Know. that I did at the Arts Theatre. That was a couple of years ago now.

Does Denise van Outen ever just sit around and chill?

"I don't really relax in that way. I don't sit around and watch box sets and things. I like golf. I like going for a drive. The nice thing about moving - because I lived in my last place for about 10 years - is that we're sort of exploring the area so it's quite nice to take the car out and go for a spin, especially when the weather's nice. We're discovering all new places to go. We've found some nice little pubs and restaurants and you can only do that really by going out. I look online but you really have to go out and try these places yourself. It's good."

UNDER THE HAMMER

Oulton Hall, Leeds, West Yorkshire 21st, 22nd & 23d February 2018

Oulton Hall was originally a "modest eighteenth-century house" owned by the Blayds family. In 1807 the house was left to John Calverley, who was a partner in Beckett's Bank and Mayor of Leeds. He changed his name to Blayds in order to inherit the property, but his descendants reverted to Calverley. He enclosed the surrounding common in 1809, and it was landscaped to designs by Humphrey Repton soon afterwards. In around 1822,

he commissioned Sir Robert Smirke to remodel the house, and it was enlarged by Smirke's brother, Sydney, in 1839. In 1850 a fire destroyed much of the property, including most of the Smirkes' work. The Leeds firm of Perkin and Backhouse rebuilt the hall, and further work was done in 1875 by Perkin and Sons and in 1885 by Chorley and Cannon of Leeds.

The hall had various uses during the 20th century. In the First World War it was used as a hospital and convalescent home for wounded soldiers, and in 1925 the hall and grounds were sold to the county council. After the owners left in the 1930s, the house was requisitioned by the military during the Second World War. It was used it as a mental hospital until 1971. Oulton Hall then changed hands, but due to the lack of resources of the new owner it fell into disrepair, and in 1974 it was derelict. In 1991 De Vere Hotels acquired the lease and rescued it. Restoration and expansion cost £20 million to turn the hall into a hotel set in an estate of 300 acres, with gardens, a 27-hole golf course and a spa.


John Hill has a butchers shop in Dunblane, Scotland and wanted to share his trade-related number plates with us.

"My first plate, was G1 GOTS [Gigots]," he tells us, "and, most recently, I've managed to obtain BR15 KET [Brisket]."


John has been in business for the past 18 years and says, "everyone knows it's me with the plates."




































randfather-of-four Alan Leslie
